Three outcomes

- Government leadership
- Preventative workplace cultures
- Industry and community leadership

Airborne Substances a National priority

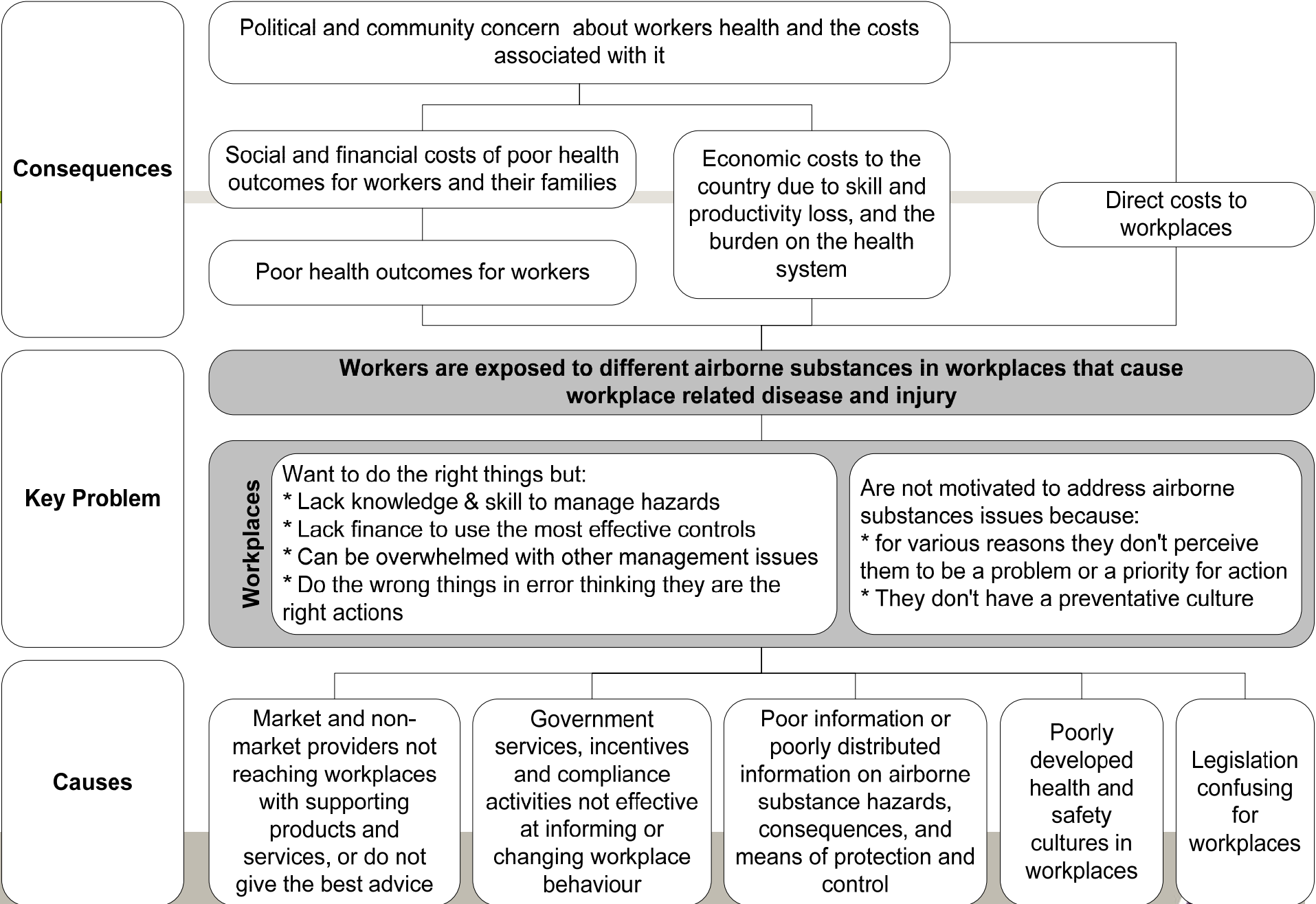


Airborne Substances Program

Purpose:

to influence workplace culture and practice so workers exposure to airborne substances is reduced or eliminated.





Four activity streams:

- Information (including research)
- Legislation
- Improving workplace performance
- Improving services to workplaces



HSE / HSNO / ACC Interface Project

- Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992 (HSE)
- Hazardous Substances and New Organisms Act 1996 (HSNO)
- Regulatory review: - HSE / HSNO / ACC interface
 - “All practicable steps”
 - “As low as reasonably achievable / practical” ALARA / ALARP
- Potential enforcement difficulty has not come up at interface meetings



Elimination and Substitution

- Asbestos
- Man Made Mineral Fibre (MMMF)
- PCP anti sap stain
- Light Organic Solvent Preservative (LOSP)
- Methyl Bromide fumigation



Management of Workplace processes

- “Historic” v current workplace issues
- Section 30 HSE Act: - “ongoing role of the inspector”
- Monitoring duties to ensure the act has been complied with
- Exposure to workers and others
- What catalyst for change?
 - Research
 - Lobbying
 - Cases
 - Community engagement / mediation / reconciliation?
